Currently, Bill is the Trail Town Program Coordinator for the Maryland Department of Planning and has been with the agency for over 25 years. The Trail Town Program is an economic development and community revitalization initiative working in "Trail Towns" along the Great Allegheny Passage. The program's purpose is to ensure that trail communities and businesses maximize the economic potential of the trail.

As ARC Program Manager, Bill will be responsible for ARC grants to projects that address one or more of the four goals identified by ARC in its <u>strategic plan</u> and that can demonstrate measurable results. Typically, ARC project grants are awarded to state and local agencies and governmental entities, local governing boards, and nonprofit organizations.



Almost all program grants originate at the state level. Potential applicants should contact their state <u>ARC</u> <u>program manager</u> to request a pre-application package. The <u>local development district</u> serving the county in which the project is located may provide guidance on a project's eligibility for funding and assistance in preparing a grant application.

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Feldstein wins Whisman Award

Al Feldstein, retired Appalachian Regional Commission program manager for the state of Maryland, received the 2015 John D. Whisman Vision Award from the Development District Association of Appalachia at its annual conference in Arlington, Va. More than 200 local development officials representing 73 economic planning and development districts in Appalachia attended the conference. The DDAA presents the award each year to an individual who has provided exemplary service and leadership in Appalachia and demonstrated a commitment to the ideals of state and federal cooperation.

Feldstein, an award-winning historian, served for several decades with the Maryland Department of Planning and has written numerous books and videotapes on Allegany, Garrett and Washington counties. Feldstein was cited for an exemplary career as a "champion for regional planning and development" in which he served as a teacher, government official, author and historian. The award noted that "the strong leadership and vision" he provided to Western Maryland and its three Appalachian counties for more than 40 years "truly demonstrate your steadfast commitment and ongoing support of community development efforts."
